## Constitution of the Mulberry Gap Association

Article 1. This Association shall be denominated **THE MULBERRY GAP ASSOCIATION OF BAPTISTS.**

Article 2. This Association shall be composed of such churches, only as stand on Constituted and Baptist Principles and such as are willing to subscribe to the before abstract of principles.

Article 3. This Association being thus formed by delegates freely chosen by their respective churches, will not recognize any person or persons as delegates, unless such person or persons produce a satisfactory testimonial of his or their appointment to represent the interests of the church where they have their membership.

Article 4. This Association shall meet annually and proceed to elect officers from her own body.

Article 5. This Association shall keep a fair record of her proceedings in a book kept by her own Recording Secretary.

Article 6. This Association shall only sit an advising Council and have no clerical power or ecclesiastical authority, each church being an independent body.

Article 7. This Association shall have power to exclude any church from her union, which shall depart from the orthodox principles and discipline of the Gospel.

Article 8. This Association will not receive or hold in fellowship any church or individual that habitually makes, buys, sells or uses as a beverage alcoholic liquors and shall withdraw from any such.

Article 9. All proceedings shall be public and all questions shall be governed by a majority except in the case of the reception of members into the union, which must be done by a unanimous voice.

Article 10. This Association shall labor faithfully to promote and perpetuate the general union by giving advice, when called for in a regular manner.

Article 11. This Association shall have correspondence with such Associations and such only as they regard orthodox in doctrine and discipline as taught in the Word of God.

Article 12. This Constitution may be amended by the concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

Article 13. This Association shall not allow any of its body to speak more than three times on the same subject, without leave of the Association.

Article 14. Voting shall be confined exclusively to the body in acts respecting their internal concerns.

Article 15. This Association shall be governed in her deliberations according to parliamentary rules.

Article 16. The Sessions of this Association shall be opened and closed by prayer.

Article 17 That every church shall have three messengers for the first 100 members or fraction thereof; over 100 they shall have an additional one to every 50 members or fraction thereof.

(Note: The Constitution was amended by unanimous vote at the regular session of this Association, in 1937, which added Article 17, as above shown.)

## Rules of Decorum

1. Every motion when seconded must be submitted by the Moderator to the consideration of the Association, and if required by any member must be made in writing.

No new motion is in order while another is pending but may be amended by the addition, exclusion, or substitution of sentences to any extent, even to the changing of the original motion to an opposite sense by striking all but the word resolve, and substituting a proposition entirely different.

2. A motion may be withdrawn by the mover before it is seconded or put to vote and if the mover accepts an offered amendment it is not necessary to put to a vote on its reception as part of the original motion.

3. The Moderator should rise to state a motion and to a question to vote, and give close attention to each speaker.

4. Motion to postpone indefinitely as to a fixed time, to lay on the table, to commit to a command, to adjourn, are called "privileged motions," as they are always in order. A motion to adjourn proceeds all others and when made without conditions of time, place or purpose, is to be taken without debate, but cannot be made when a member is speaking or can any other motion be made without his consent.

5. When a motion is before the Association any member may freely express his opinion upon it, and while he keeps to the point and does not violate the rules of courtesy, the Moderator must protect him from interruption, but if he breaks any rule of decorum he may be called to order, and required to proceed in order or close.

6. The Moderator must decide all questions of order, but any member who thinks his decision incorrect may appeal to the meeting whose decision is final.

7. If a motion includes two subjects it must be decided at the request of any member and the vote taken on each separately.

8. Motions and amendments are to be considered and voted on in the reverse order in which they are offered, the amendment must first be taken up and decided; if an amendment be offered to any amendment it come to be first in order, then the amendment, then the main question.

9. When the question is to be taken it should be first clearly stated by the Moderator, calling first for affirmative, next, negative votes. If the votes are equally divided, the Moderator may give the casting vote or by declaring not to vote, may leave the question negative. Each member is bound to vote on all questions unless excused; those not voting being considered as acquiescing in the decision of the majority.

10. After the question is put to vote there can be no discussion or motions until the voting is finished. A motion to reconsider a vote may be made by any member voting with the majority at its passage. Such motions opens the subject for discussion and a vote to reconsider brings back to the first, where it was before passed.

11. When a member wishes to offer a motion or speak on a question he must arise and address the Moderator respectfully. A member about to make a motion may preface it by remarks to explain its design, but with this exception all speaking is out of order which is not directed to some definite proposition before the meeting.

Be It Resolved that: We prohibit anyone from serving as Moderator of this Association who advocates or practices standing up and praying in Church or this Association. (This article was added to the Rules of Decorum by this Association August 14, 1969.)

## Mulberry Gap Association of Missionary Baptists First Day, August 13, 1969

1. The One Hundred and Thirty-First Annual Session of the Mulberry Gap Association of Missionary Baptists convened on Wednesday morning, August 13, 1969, in the Big Creek Missionary Baptist Church, Sneedville, Tennessee, with Rev. Alfred Greene, Moderator, presiding, who called said body to order.

The Clerk then called the roll of all the churches and Messengers voted.

The report of tellers showed that Rev. Alfred Greene was elected Moderator, and C. W. Burton, Clerk.

11. Order of Business: Earl Hardin, Rev. John Davis.

12. Religious Exercises. Pastor and Deacons of Big Creek Church.

13. 1970 Program Committee: Rev. McKinley Reed, Chairman; Rev. Henry Drinnon, Rev. Carl Livesay.

14. Motion by Rev. Ruble Price and seconded by Rev. Loyd Stewart, to retain present Committee on newly constituted churches, namely: Rev. Hoil Minor, Rev. Miller L. Vaughn, Earl Hardin and C. W. Burton.

15. Motion by Rev. Lester Greene and seconded by Rev. Johnny Coffey, to retain the present Executive Board (names on front cover.)

16. Report of Committee on Order of Business, read by Earl Hardin.

to carry out this work as taught in the Bible, that we should carry the Gospel into all the world.

We will all agree, I'm sure, that this is far too little because God loves a cheerful giver.

This program is the means of supporting many phases of our Baptist work, and if there ever was a time, that we needed to work together, it is now.

We say to all the people of this Association, "Please give more next year, in order that the gospel may be carried to all parts of the world."

There is no better way to do this than through the Cooperative Program. Let us earn the name Missionary Baptist, instead of just Baptist, by praying, living right and giving our money to this great cause.

Care of people in need, was the business of the churches, in New Testament times. The first deacons, elected, were to function as a benevolent committee—Acts 6:1-6. The first offering was for human need.

The New Testament Churches, closely following the teachings and footsteps of Jesus, had both an evangelistic passion and a benevolent compassion.

We should do no less. Christian compassion is at its greatest in the care of homeless and dependent children.

Our Tennessee Baptist Children's Homes were established for the care of orphaned, homeless, needy and unwanted children, as a benevolent and Missionary arm of our churches.

There are not many of our churches, which can operate a Children's home, but together, we can support four very fine Homes and care for hundreds of children.

During the past year, 481 boys and girls have received care through the four homes. In the seventy-eight years, since the founding of the first Home, eight thousand children have received help in these Homes. This is made possible by your offerings and support.

37. TEMPERANCE REPORT. Read by Rev. Loyd Stewart.

We, your Committee on Temperance, report as follows:

Alcohol is the number one enemy in our schools, businesses, highways, families and churches.

In 1968, 14 billion dollars were spent for alcohol. In 1969, 15 billion dollars were spent for alcohol. This being an increase of one billion dollars in one year.

Statistics show that there is an increase of eight hundred thousand drinkers of alcohol each year, including a 60% increase of women drinkers, also that 80% of college students are drinkers of alcohol. Statistics show too that drunken drivers have led to 25,000 deaths, and that at least 800,000 accidents.

We also believe that indecent dress is detrimental to our morals, and is a cause of much disrespect for our people, especially our women and young girls.

We furthermore believe that every Christian should strive to eliminate these evils.
